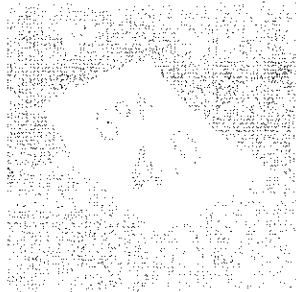


## High School GPA changes for the school year 2016-17

The following changes to GPA are being implemented for our students beginning this school year:

- ❖ The College Board 4.0 GPA model will be implemented.
- ❖ It will become the official GPA for 9<sup>th</sup> – 11<sup>th</sup> graders.
- ❖ It will become the UNofficial GPA for seniors (available upon request).
- ❖ Seniors will remain unchanged as the 100 point scale will be used as the official GPA and will determine class rank.
- ❖ Once again, seniors stay the same – the 100 scale will be used for official GPAs and class ranks.
- ❖ 9<sup>th</sup> – 11<sup>th</sup> graders will see their 4.0 GPAs on their report cards.
- ❖ Students with AP courses will receive 1.0 quality point to the 4.0 GPA scale. . The AP weighting model will be implemented with the graduating class of 2017.
- ❖ For this year, honor roll and eligibility will continue to use the percentage grade average that will be printed on report cards.
- ❖ Percent grades will continue to be used on report cards
- ❖ 60% average is still needed to pass each course

- The first column shows the letter grade that some school systems and colleges use.
- The second column aligns with our percentage grades.
- The third column shows how the percentage grade will convert to the 4.0 scale.
- The fourth column shows the 1 quality point that is added for each AP class.

Therefore, if a student earns an 88 in class, they would get a 3.3 on the 4.0 scale and if it was an AP course then it would convert to a 4.3.
